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FAIL = First Attempt In Learning

During the recent Regional Student Council Workshops conducted in eight Kansas communities during October, guest speaker Heather Schultz shared an acronym applicable for all who seek to continue to grow and learn. The acronym is “FAIL” which represents a “First Attempt In Learning.” What a powerful message for all to consider as every time we are testing, performing, or competing and “fail” by falling short of the desired outcome, learning becomes our opportunity.

Consider each word in the phrase “First Attempt In Learning.” While “First” indicates you are in the initial phases of a trial, it also reflects you are not finished with such an initial effort. There will be next opportunities to learn, and each one will help refine you and define the result. The word “Attempt” reflects your active participation in the learning – you are engaged in pursuing the desired outcome and not just waiting for something to happen. The word “In” reflects your focus and intentionality to accomplish the result you seek. And finally, “Learning” is an indication that we are truly changing as a result of the activity engagement. As we learn, we grow and improve, and are prepared for new and more challenging opportunities.

While no one likes to fail, student growth is realized when collectively and individually, students are appropriately challenged and supported in their learning opportunities. When a task is too easy, the growth can be minimal as no stretching and resourcefulness are necessary to achieve the desired result. However, when a task is challenging and provides opportunities for students to fail, then refine their effort and game plan to improve, real learning can occur. Certainly, it is critical for our students facing such a challenge to understand they have the support of coaches, sponsors and teachers alongside to encourage and guide (not to enable) to help make the learning possible.

As you pursue growth, translate each fail into a learn!

PARENTS AND ADULT FANS: THE BIGGEST CHALLENGE FACING HIGH SCHOOL SPORTS TODAY

Inappropriate adult behavior at high school athletic events in Kansas has reached epidemic proportion.

When more than 2,000 high school athletic directors were asked in a recent national survey what they like least about their job, 62.3% said it was “dealing with aggressive parents and adult fans.”

And the men and women who wear the black and white stripes agree. In fact, almost 80% of officials quit after the first two years on the job, and unruly parents are cited as the reason why. As a result, there is a growing shortage of high school officials here in Kansas, and in some sports like wrestling, soccer, and baseball/softball, the shortage is severe. No officials means no more games.

If you are a parent attending a high school athletic event this fall, you can help by following these six guidelines:

1. **Be a Role Model.** You are, after all, an adult. Act in a way that makes your family and school proud and teaches lessons we want our children to learn. They are watching. They will imitate.
2. **Don't Live Your Life Vicariously Through Your Children.** High school sports are for them, not you. Your family's reputation is not determined by how well your children perform on the field of play.
3. **Let Your Children Talk to the Coach Instead of You Doing It for Them.** High school athletes learn how to become more confident, independent and capable—but only when their parents don't jump in and solve their problems for them.
4. **Stay in Your Own Lane.** No coaching or officiating from the sidelines. Your role is to be a responsible, supportive parent—not a coach or official.
5. **Remember, Participating in a High School Sport Is Not About Getting a College Scholarship.** According to the NCAA, only about 2% of all high school athletes are awarded a sports scholarship, and the total value of the scholarship is only about \$18,000. In fact, there are more dollars available for more students with academic scholarships than what is available to athletes.
6. **Make Sure Your Children Know You Love Watching Them Play.** Do not critique your child's performance on the car ride home. Participating in high school sports is about character development, learning and having fun—not winning and losing.

Purchasing a ticket to a high school athletic event does not give you the right to be rude, disrespectful or verbally abusive. Cheer loud and be proud, but be responsible and respectful. The future of high school sports in Kansas is dependent on you.

Questions and Answers-KSHSAA Aids to Interpretation

Executive Director's Note: At the request of member schools, the KSHSAA periodically shares questions and answers pertaining to KSHSAA bylaws, rules and Executive Board policies. Question #1: Our athletic director has been asked by one of our school's basketball coaches about attending a college clinic with players from our school team prior to the first day of school practice. Is this permissible?

Answer: The KSHSAA Seasons of Activities Rule 30-1-3 prohibits coaches and coaches aides from attending camps or clinics with their athletes during the school year, outside the school season of sport. It would be possible for the coaches to attend the college clinic provided basketball players from his/her school were not also in attendance. In order for basketball players from your school to attend the college clinic, your coaches must not be present.

Question #2: Our school would like to send a scout to the preseason intrasquad basketball scrimmage of the school which would be our first opponent this season. Is it permissible for us to video their intrasquad scrimmage?

Answer: No, per KSHSAA policy, it is not permissible to video another member school's practices or contests without written permission from the principal. It would be permissible for you to attend scrimmages or contests which are open to the public.

Question #3: Our school is considering participation in a music competition. Our director has asked whether the students in the marching band, which will participate for a rating, have to meet eligibility requirements?

Answer: Students in all KSHSAA interscholastic activities must meet academic, age and transfer eligibility requirements. While most people are aware that students on athletic teams have to meet eligibility, many are uncertain about activities like music, speech, debate and scholars bowl. It is important that directors and coaches of non-athletic activities work closely with

their school principal or activities director to ensure that all students meet eligibility standards. (Use Eligibility Worksheet Form CW & CW-M/J for this purpose.)

Question #4: Our school wants to hire an employee of our district to coach a sport, but the employee is not a certified teacher. Can we hire this person as a coach? Do we have to apply for approval on Form A?

Answer: Yes, you may hire a non-teacher employee of your district to coach, provided you apply for approval using Form A. This coach would be a supervised Coach Aide.

Fundraising - Important Considerations

In times of increasingly tight school budgets, more school teams and coaches are becoming involved in fundraising efforts to raise money to purchase school uniforms, warmups, shoes, etc. When this occurs, several important considerations should be kept in mind. 1) Many schools and school districts have policies requiring pre-approval of fundraising activities, to ensure their patrons and business community are not overwhelmed by constant fundraising by school teams, clubs etc. 2) Money generated by fundraising activities must be carefully and accurately accounted for to protect the intent of the donor as well as the integrity and reputation of the individual(s) organizing the fundraising. Coaches and sponsors should follow the school or district's policies on accounting for funds, and the auditor of the school should be consulted in the event of questions. Accounting for school activity funds is a major responsibility and must be taken seriously to protect everyone involved. **The Kansas State Department of Education advises schools to be certain to follow the statutory procedures for accepting gifts, K.S.A. 72-8210.**

When money from fundraising activities is being spent to purchase team equipment, uniforms, warmups, wind suits, shoes, etc., the goods purchased become the property of the school and are part of the school's inventory. At the end of the season, year or useful life of the shoes, jerseys, etc., schools may sell those items to students if permissible by local policy, but must do so at a fair market price for comparable used goods. To simply give the items to the students would be a violation of **Awards Rule 20**. The Awards Rule considers booster clubs, individual boosters and charitable foundations such as school foundations the same as the school itself. These entities may not give shoes, garments, etc., to individual students. They may raise funds to donate to the school which the school may then use to acquire the needed items for the team.

Halftime Contests or Skill Contests

The following interpretation of the KSHSAA **Awards Rule 20** and **Amateur Rule 21** has been established by the Executive Board to address questions relating to athletic skill contests staged at events sponsored by member schools, colleges or other organizations.

When a student is selected by chance or random drawing to participate in a halftime or pregame contest involving a sport skill (e.g. throwing, kicking, or shooting a basketball), he or she may receive cash or a merchandise prize from the contest without affecting eligibility under KSHSAA amateur and awards rules. An example might be a booster club fundraiser, drawing to shoot a half-court

or three point shot, or pass a football to win a prize. Such a random drawing of names, or lucky number in a program determining the participant, would not be a violation of amateur or awards rules.

During the season of activity, a player from a school team is permitted to participate in such contests, provided the selection occurs randomly.

National Contests and Activities on *www.nassp.org*

The National Advisory List of Contests, Programs and Activities for students is prepared and published by the National Association of Secondary School Principals through its National Committee on Student Contests, Programs and Activities. The Advisory List is available only on NASSP's National Association of Student Councils website. To access the Advisory List:

The purpose of the National Advisory List is to provide information to assist principals, teachers, parents and students in making decisions regarding participation in a wide variety of program opportunities. The committee reviews all programs based on the following standards: educational, financial, organizational, promotional, adjudication and awards. Programs that, in the opinion of the committee, meet the guidelines are placed on the National Advisory List.

The 2020-21 program applications will be available to download in late November 2019 with a February 1, 2020 deadline.

The inclusion of a student program on the National Advisory List does not imply endorsement by the National Association of Secondary School Principals. A program being listed indicates that it has been reviewed by a committee of NASSP member principals and found to meet the established standards of quality for student contests and activities established by the National Committee and approved by the NASSP Board of Directors.

Any contest or activity under the jurisdiction of the KSHSAA sponsored by an outside agency which is on the approved list of the National Association of Secondary School Principals shall be considered automatically approved.

November 2019

Rule 48 Prohibits Pyramids and Basket Tosses

Attention is called to **Rule 48-1-4** found in the KSHSAA Handbook on page 50, and related article on page 34 of the August *Activities Journal*.

Should coaches or administrators observe violations of the rules by other schools, please contact the KSHSAA office and advise us of the violations. As there are no officials for cheerleading, it is vital school administrators enforce the rules for the safety of the participants.

Summer Moratorium

July 2-8, 2020 is the summer moratorium. There shall be NO school related athletic activities. During this time coaches (licensed teacher coaches and coach aides employed by member schools) shall be prohibited from engaging in any type of activity involving student-athletes whether it be practice, training, weight lifting, conditioning, competition or travel. All member school athletic facilities will be closed during this period to school personnel and students grades 7-12. If member school athletic facilities also serve as non-school community recreation facilities, these facilities may remain open during the moratorium so long as no school teams are playing and no school coaches are coaching the teams/individuals. During this one week dead period, students may attend camps or competitions but may not do so with their school coaches. This moratorium does not impact fine arts or spirit activities.

Wireless Microphones and FCC Bandwidth Information for Schools

There will be an upcoming change in the FCC bandwidth that could affect school wireless microphone systems. By 2020, wireless microphones in the 600 MHz and 700 MHz bands will be reduced due to the sale of these frequencies to wireless service providers. Below you will find a link with the FCC information, and it will also be posted on the KSHSAA website homepage under NEW TOPICS and can also be found on the NFHS performing arts pages for your reference.

Some microphone companies are offering rebates to upgrade microphone systems that will be affected.

AED Checklist

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is the number one cause of sudden death in student-athletes during activity. In the event of a sudden cardiac arrest episode an automated external defibrillator (AED) can save a life. Each minute defibrillation is delayed, the chance of survival decreases 10%. The following can serve as an AED checklist to be sure you are prepared.

- ☐ The AED is easily accessible at every practice/game location and available for use within 2-3 minutes (ideally it is onsite). The device is NOT in a locked or secured area where retrieval could be a challenge.
- ☐ Personnel are always available onsite who are trained in CPR and AED use.

- ☐ The AED is checked regularly to ensure it is working and the pads and battery are not expired.
- ☐ The Emergency Action Plan has been rehearsed PRIOR to the beginning of the season with everyone potentially involved in the emergency response.
- ☐ Someone has been designated to retrieve the AED if needed. This person knows the exact location of the device at all times.

KSHSAA Sanctioning Policy - “Approved Events”

Bylaw XIV requires sanctioning of all activities under the jurisdiction of the KSHSAA which includes athletics, music, debate, speech, spirit groups and scholars bowl. KSHSAA member schools shall not participate in interstate interscholastic activities under the jurisdiction of the KSHSAA involving four or more schools and two or more states (including Kansas) unless such events have been approved by the KSHSAA and the out-of-state high school's association(s). Exception: *Dual and Triangular events do not require sanctioning unless three states are involved.*

- Kansas member schools wishing to sponsor these types of interstate interscholastic events must complete “Form G-1” pages 3 and 4 (found behind school login under administrator's password, Entry Forms>Yearly-Letter Forms) at least 30 days prior to the date of the activity and fax or email to the KSHSAA. On page 3 of Form G-1, Section 1 must be completed and signed by a school administrator, and on page 4, list all schools invited to attend (including city and state). If the list is long, a computer listing may be submitted in place of page 4.
- Member schools wishing to attend these types of interstate interscholastic events sponsored in another state must contact the manager to verify a sanction form has been filed with their state association, who in turn will contact the KSHSAA for approval. All applications must be initiated by the manager of the event to their state high school association.

The sanctioning process is to assure only bona fide member schools are involved in interscholastic activities. KSHSAA Bylaw-Article I-Sec. 4 states, “each school in joining the Association expressly agrees not to contest with schools which are non-members of this Association or of the state associations of the states in which they are located.”

Administrators, coaches and directors should always check the “approved events” link on the front page of the KSHSAA website before scheduling or attending any interstate event.

2020 KSHSAA Spirit of Sport and Heart of the Arts Awards Nominations Now Being Accepted

The KSHSAA Spirit of Sport and Heart of the Arts Awards recognize values inherent in participation in high school sports and fine arts beyond winning and losing. The KSHSAA invites all member senior high schools to submit the name of an individual, coach or team demonstrating such qualities for the 2020 KSHSAA Spirit of Sport and Heart of the Arts Awards. Nominations are due by December 31, 2019.

Nominations must be submitted online by an administrator. The nomination form will be posted on the KSHSAA website and may only be accessed through the school's password and ID login. Senior high school principals, athletic directors and activity directors should login and go to the Entry Forms section and select Special Forms. Click on the 2019-20 Spirit of Sport or Heart of the Arts Nomination Forms to submit the nominee.

The KSHSAA Student Advisory Team assists in the selection of the state of Kansas honorees, and the KSHSAA nominees will be submitted in consideration for national recognition by the National Federation of State High School Associations. The National Federation initiated the NFHS Spirit of Sport Award in 2007; 2013-14 was the inaugural year for the Heart of the Arts Award. The NFHS will announce national honorees at its annual summer meeting in July.

Kansas schools should be proud to know that our state association was the first to develop the Spirit of Sport and Heart of the Arts Awards for the express purpose of recognizing those individuals demonstrating leadership, character, sportsmanship and citizenship through participation in the interscholastic activity program. As educators, we know these character traits should be recognized and reinforced. While the acts performed are never for personal recognition, we are certainly proud of the mature and thoughtful acts demonstrated by students and staff who live the mission of the KSHSAA with their actions. Please take time to nominate those from your community for their selfless service.

Spotlight on Officials

A Family Tradition

Many officials set goals for themselves as they begin their avocation. Some wish to make it to the collegiate level or maybe even the professional level. Others want to get to “state” and work a championship. Or maybe they just want to keep progressing at their craft and be a solid, respected high school official. For one family, a goal turned into more of a bucket list. This season they ran a Sharpie through a check box.

Saturday, September 7, mom, dad, and the two daughters worked the same event together at the Three Rivers League Volleyball Tournament. “I was excited for this opportunity, it has been on my personal ‘bucket list’ for some time,” said Tracy Smith. “Teresa (Smith) and I work together quite often, and with Kaity (Bradbury) living in our area, I get to work with her at times. Now that Abbie (Thomas, Topeka) is registered, Teresa and I find the opportunities to try to work with her and have requested matches in that area. The Three Rivers Tournament was large enough to play on four courts, so it was wonderful that the four of us were calling matches on side by side courts.”

Mom, Teresa Smith, and dad, Tracy Smith, each began as registered volleyball officials in 2006. For 14 years they have taken the court together. You could certainly say volleyball is a family tradition. The parents showed what opportunities were still there in the game and it didn’t take much for Kaitlyn and Abbie to join.

“Kaitlyn did not play college volleyball, so we encouraged her to officiate as a part-time job during her college years,” said Teresa. “Abbie did play college volleyball but saw officiating as a way to stay involved and give back to a sport she loves. Obviously having parents as officials made it a natural choice for both.”

They may not all get to work together often but they are very familiar with each other’s experiences. “We call each other on the way to our games to discuss our upcoming matches and then after to share any unusual situations,” Kaitlyn explained.

Kaitlyn Bradbury, a mom, cattle rancher and educator, has been registered for 13 years in volleyball. Playing the game in high school she was familiar with the game, obviously, but learned a lot from her dad as she began officiating.

“My dad served as my mentor,” said Kaitlyn. “He has always been the standard I strive to achieve. When I started, he told me to always read the rules book before the season started, to find a way to attend the meetings, and to practice my mechanics in front of a mirror. Thirteen years later, I still do those things to start a season, and by staying consistent with the fundamentals and knowing the rules, it has made me a better official year after year.”

Abbie, an Assistant Controller at Stormont Vail, said the advice she received from her parents was simple but the number one thing all officials need to remember, “My parents told me to take your time and make the right call.”

Many families in Kansas grow up around a sport. Whether it is coaching, watching your kids play or playing, they have a vested interest. It doesn’t just go away. Officiating is a way the Smiths have stayed in a game they love and grew up with.

“As a principal and my wife as a teacher and both daughters involved in volleyball, our family actually grew up in a gymnasium,” said Tracy. “Teresa and I often kept score, line judged and obviously, as the administrator, set up and administered the events.”

How did it all begin? Their daughters had graduated so Tracy and Teresa found something they could do together and still be involved in the game.

“Teresa played volleyball in high school, so it was a natural ‘jump’ for her,” said Tracy. “Me, I was always football! But with two daughters...the change was harder for me. I’m blessed that I am surrounded by ‘my girls’ that know the game and through them my knowledge base blossomed. Officiating at lower levels to begin, watching Kaity coach at Pitt State and then watching Abbie play at Pitt State, volleyball has become my passion.”

Every official gets their start, they set goals and hope to attain them. Having family along the way certainly makes it enjoyable.

“They (her family) are all GREAT officials, and I think we make each other better each time we get to work together,” said Abbie.

BASKETBALL

Head Coaches Must Complete Rules Meetings

All head high school and middle/junior high school coaches must complete the online rules meeting by November 22. Failure to complete the meeting will result in a \$100 fine.

Exam Due November 22

Head high school and middle/junior high school coaches must submit the answers to NFHS Test I by November 22. Don't wait until the last day to submit the test. Carefully follow the instructions for submitting the test by the deadline. Failure to submit the test on time will result in a \$100 fine. Test results will be available for coaches and officials after November 22.

After the test is turned off, coaches can view all test questions and rules references. This should be a good educational tool.

Six Quarter Rule

Basketball players may participate in six quarters in a night. During games played on the same night a player is allowed to participate in six quarters. Participating in a 7th quarter is a violation of KSHSAA rules and must be reported to the KSHSAA office. Tournaments are not included in this rule. Schools having JV and varsity (or two other levels) teams in tournaments the same week may not allow players to play six (6) quarters in one day in two different tournament brackets. The six quarter rule is applied only during regular game nights – not tournaments. The tournament exception applies to playing two games in one day in the same tournament. This format is generally used for sub-level tournaments.

Middle/Junior High School Exception

To facilitate more efficient travel and scheduling, a middle/junior high school player may participate in two games in one day during a one day, non-tournament, multi-team competition.

Practice Begins

The first day of practice for high school teams is November 18, 2019. A preseason meeting may be held prior to that to review team rules and check out equipment. The holiday non-practice dates are December 22-26, 2019. Students in grades 7-12 may not be in member school owned or operated facilities during the non-practice days for involvement in activities under the jurisdiction of the KSHSAA. Middle/junior high seasons are

determined by the school. The date practice starts is the beginning of the season and it ends following the last contest. Students may not participate on outside teams in the same sport while a member of the school team.

Check Floor Markings & Basket

Prior to the beginning of practice, coaches, athletic directors and principals should inspect the basketball floor to ensure lines are properly marked. Specifically, per Rule 1-3-2 a solid 2-inch contrasting line shall divide the court; the game shall not start until the line is there. Kansas has adopted the optional 28-foot coaching box. Per Rule 1-13, mark 28 feet from the end line toward the half court line. The other line is outside the court at the end line. The 2-inch wide lines shall be off the court. An "X" 12 inches long and 2 inches wide shall be placed on the floor in front of the score table. **If the 28-foot box is not marked it cannot be used.**

The NFHS Rule 1-3-1 allows a 1/4-inch wide line to show the edge of the center circle. The center circle must be marked. The previous rule allowed only a 2-inch line to mark the center circle. With many schools putting mascots in the center circle area, the change allows the center circle line to be 1/4-inch on the outside of the 6-foot radius so there is not a 2-inch line in the mascot. A 2-inch center line is also required. It can be marked with a shadow border line.

The rules committee also recommended that schools check their basket ring. Manufacturers indicate that the breakaway rings lose their characteristics over time and with "hard" use. Schools should test their rings to ensure the characteristics and properties are conducive to the rules for competition.

Sporting Behavior

During online basketball rules meetings this fall the KSHSAA and NFHS have covered as a point of emphasis, sporting behavior concerning players, coaches and spectators. Administrators are being made aware of these points of emphasis as many require cooperation between administrators, officials, coaches and spectators. The following areas were addressed at the rules meetings.

Sporting Behavior – Player Uniforms

Players are increasingly using uniforms in unsporting ways. Examples include: holding the uniform out from the chest to display a team name; pulling the uniform out of shorts in an emotional display; removing the jersey while in the court area following disqualification. The KSHSAA expects jerseys to be worn properly and remain on. Players removing their jersey in the visual confines of the playing area will receive a technical foul. Players must also keep their jersey tucked in their shorts, and shorts must be worn properly above the hips. A player in violation will be directed to leave the game. Coaches and school administrators should reinforce this rule with their players.

Sporting Behavior – Spectators

Fan behavior remains a critical concern. Too often, fans are using abusive language toward coaches, players and officials. Fans are also approaching the court, team areas and locker rooms – places that used to be "off limits" – to confront participants.

Game administrators must: provide a safe environment for players, coaches and officials; create and follow security pro-

cedures; support efforts to have offending fans removed from the premises; and address problems before the official must point them out.

Coaches must not incite fan behavior. Sideline actions have a significant impact on fan behavior – positively or negatively. School administrators must discuss expectations with coaches prior to the season and monitor them throughout the season.

Officials should never directly confront fans. They are to find a game administrator to take care of the problem. In extreme cases, delay the game until the offending fan is dealt with by administration. If a game administrator is not present, the head coach serves in this capacity.

Sporting Behavior – Coaching Box

Coaches must stay in the 28-foot coaching box. Wandering coaches present problems: distinct advantage gained by ability to better communicate with team; interferes with play; distracting to players and officials; perceived as an intimidation tactic toward officials and table personnel; can incite inappropriate player, bench and spectator behaviors. The rule is very clear and officials have been instructed to enforce the rule. School administrators must address appropriate behavior with their coaches. Assistant coaches do not have the same privileges as the head coach. Assistant coaches must be seated at ALL times, except: during time-outs or intermissions, to attend to an injured player after being beckoned, or to spontaneously react to a play.

The KSHSAA expects school administrators from all member schools to meet with their coaches to review these rules and set expectations for the season. At preseason meetings fan behavior should be addressed. When administrators, coaches, officials, players and spectators understand the expectations and enforcement of the rules adopted by KSHSAA member schools, student-athletes will have rewarding experiences. School administration who observe officials not enforcing the box are to notify the KSHSAA of the names of the officials.

Coach Ejection Policy

Any coach ejected from a contest (at all levels grades 7-12) must complete the NFHS “Teaching and Modeling Behavior” course prior to coaching in their next event. (Next event would be defined as the next regularly scheduled day of competition. An ejected coach could complete a tournament in progress before completing the course requirement.) Course fee is \$20 and can be completed in one hour. The school administrator is responsible to provide KSHSAA with a copy of the coach’s certificate proving completion of the online course. The coach may print this as the final step of the online course. Recurring ejection(s) result in a requirement to repeat the course.

Player Ejection Policy

Any player ejected from a contest at any level of play (grades 7-12) for unsporting conduct or behavior will be required to successfully complete the free “NFHS Sportsmanship Course” online, prior to the KSHSAA and school reinstating his/her eligibility privileges. The school principal or athletic director is responsible to oversee compliance of this requirement. There is no cost for the course which takes approximately 20 minutes to complete. Schools are not required to submit the student’s certificate of completion to the KSHSAA but should retain it on file.

Dunking, Hanging on Rim

Players may not dunk the ball at any time during warm-ups, regardless of whether or not the officials are present. It is the responsibility of coaches and game administration to ensure this does not occur. This includes halftime warm-ups of the preceding game. Players are not to grasp the baskets at any time during the game except to prevent injury, dunk or stuff, or attempt to dunk or stuff a dead ball (NFHS BB Rule 10-4-3).

KSHSAA Executive Board policy states: Officials observing dunking during a warm-up period (including halftime of the proceeding game) should report the team violating and the number of the player violating to the score table. This may be the officials waiting for the next game, or the officials from the game in progress. The officials who have jurisdiction over the game will administer a bench technical to the violating team prior to the game starting.

If a glass or backboard is broken due to dunking or grasping a ring during warm-up, the responsible school shall be liable for the cost of replacing the board.

Rule 33 – Middle/Junior High School Player Limitations

Rule 33-1-4 has been revised to allow middle school/junior high students to participate on non-school teams without the three player limitation. The exception states: “There are no player limits on 7th and 8th grade students from SCW #17 through SCW #34 on non-school basketball teams. During the school season players may not participate on non-school teams. School coach restrictions still apply.” This year the dates where there are no player limitations are October 27, 2019 through March 1, 2020.

State Adopted Basketball

The Spalding TF1000 Legacy is the basketball that will be used in all postseason contests. During the regular season, schools may use any ball that has the NFHS authenticating mark on it.

Breast Cancer Awareness Nights

The KSHSAA receives several inquiries about schools having “Think Pink” nights or other activities to increase breast cancer awareness. The KSHSAA will not approve playing a varsity game with a pink basketball. Some schools have requested wearing pink jerseys instead of white at one home game. **These requests will be handled by the KSHSAA on an individual basis with the schools involved and must be made two (2) weeks before the event.** NFHS playing rules do not allow pink jerseys to be worn as home uniforms without an exception letter from the state association. Players may not keep the pink uniforms unless they are purchased by the player. **Wearing of pink wristbands and headbands would also need to be approved by the KSHSAA for varsity games.** Players could wear pink shoelaces, shoes, warm up shirts and have pink towels on the sideline without KSHSAA approval. If you have questions about an activity your school is planning during the basketball season contact Francine Martin.

Summer Contact Period

As schools begin looking at summer camps, be reminded of the coaching contact days allowed.

May 23 - July 19, 2020 – Coaches are permitted to coach athletes from their school squad in non-school competition.

Beginning May 26 until July 20 coaches may conduct a “one week coach’s team camp”.

July 20 - August 1, 2020 – No coaches one-week team camps may be held during this time in any sport. Basketball, football and volleyball coaches are restricted to working with a limited number of players during these two weeks (basketball-3; volleyball-4; 11-man football-6; 8-man football-5).

August 2 - August 16, 2020 – Students may continue to do voluntary weight training and conditioning. No sport specific instruction is permitted by basketball, football or volleyball coaches. No coaches one-week team camps are permitted.

Remember, all summer workouts must be voluntary. School administrators and coaches should work together and share athletes that may be involved in multiple sports.

BOWLING

Season to Begin Soon

Another season of interscholastic bowling will begin soon. Participating schools received four bowling manuals in October and are asked to review the contents thoroughly. Along with the manuals, there was a written exam to be completed by the head coach.

Two Classifications in 2019-20

Eighty-nine member schools have signed up to participate in the 2019-20 interscholastic bowling season, with 34 schools in Class 6A girls (30 in boys) and 52 schools in Class 5-1A. The association will conduct two classes of postseason bowling competition.

Tryouts

3. Students must have a physical examination in order to try out. They will need a PPE (physical exam) on file in the school office prior to their first day of school tryouts.

KSHSAA State Tournaments - Thursday, March 5 and Friday, March 6, 2020

Due to the increased popularity of interscholastic bowling and the crowds in attendance at postseason tournaments, the KSHSAA Board of Directors voted to conduct a two-day state bowling tournament, beginning with the 2008-09 school year. In addition to most bowling centers not being able to accommodate the large state crowds, an all-day Saturday tournament is a financial challenge for a bowling center. By conducting two tournaments on Thursday and two tournaments on Friday (at a time determined by the host school and bowling proprietor), bowling centers will be able to earn some previously lost revenue. Additionally, a split session will allow the least amount of disruption to the normal schedule of the center.

In even-numbered years, the 6A tournaments will be conducted on the first day, followed by the 5-1A tournaments on the second day. In even-numbered years the schedule will have boys competing first followed by the girls.

Senior High Weigh-Ins

The KSHSAA Executive Board approved that all senior high wrestling weigh-ins will follow NFHS Rule 4-5. All weigh-ins will be conducted as shoulder-to-shoulder weigh-ins.

Postseason Weigh-Ins

The KSHSAA Executive Board approved and states that regional teams will weigh-in at the regional tournament locations; **NFHS Rule 4-5-2** will be followed.

In addition, state tournament weigh-ins will be conducted at the state tournament site, as was done last season.

Head Coaches Must Attend the Online Rules Meeting

All head wrestling coaches must attend the online KSHSAA rules meeting. The meeting can be observed from October 16 to November 20. Coaches may attend an in-person meeting for credit.

Rules Books, Case Books

All wrestling matches are to be conducted under the official rules of the National Federation, with state modifications. The NFHS 2019-20 Wrestling Rules Book and Wrestling Case Book & Official's Manual are \$7 each.

Wrestling Rule 44

Section 2, Article 6 provides: No student representing a member high school shall participate in more than 18 events and no more than 30 competition points during a season, exclusive of the state championship series. Note: Schools may participate in no more than two (2) events (any combination of a double dual, quad [triple dual] and/or one-day tournament) that begin before 3 p.m. on weekdays. Double duals and quads (triple duals) scheduled for Monday through Thursday shall not start before 3 p.m. Two-day tournaments shall be scheduled on Friday and Saturday. Tournaments are defined as competition involving more than four teams.

2019-20 Wrestling Season - Hydration Assessments Required in Senior High Competition

The KSHSAA Executive Board requires hydration assessment of high school wrestlers twice during the season. All students participating in interscholastic wrestling at the high school level will be required to have a hydration assessment taken at two different times in the season: 1) at the time of their initial/first weigh-in when they can begin practice (the weigh-in which will be termed the "alpha" weigh-in) and 2) at the time the wrestler establishes their minimum certified competition wrestling weight class (the "certification" weigh-in). The KSHSAA will send out certification weigh-in information before the season begins.

The KSHSAA staff has developed and prepared information and materials that will be mailed to every KSHSAA member senior high school participating in wrestling. The materials include nutritional information for wrestlers and their families gathered from reputable sources.

The major components of the hydration assessment requirement are:

1. Alpha weigh-ins may begin any time during SCW #19 (the KSHSAA "buffer week"). For the 2019-20 season SCW #19 begins on November 11, 2019.
 - a. Hydration assessments during the alpha weigh-in will be under the supervision of and conducted by anyone so designated by the school administration (principal and/or athletic director) other than the school wrestling coach(es) (suggested—school nurse, medical care provider from the community health department, certified athletic trainer, etc.).
 - b. Hydration assessments may be conducted using either a refractometer or by using the KSHSAA Hydration Chart in combination with reagent test strips. Test strips will be provided to schools upon request.
 - c. The alpha weight will be the benchmark for application of the existing KSHSAA weight-loss provisions for certification as explained in the KSHSAA Wrestling Manual.
2. Weight Certification (Weight Control Program)
 - a. Students participating in interscholastic wrestling at the high school level may have their certification weigh-in conducted any time prior to or on Saturday, December 21, 2019. The wrestler must complete and pass the additional hydration assessment immediately and prior to the certification weigh-in. A school administrator shall record the exact weight (record the exact weight to a tenth of a pound) and the hydration assessment.
 - b. THE CERTIFICATION WEIGH-IN DOES NOT HAVE TO TAKE PLACE ON A DAY OF COMPETITION.**
 - c. If a student has not certified by the initial deadline date, because they have not provided a urine sample which meets the hydration standard, then the alpha hydration weigh-in will serve as the certification weigh-in.
 - d. A formal request for a late certification must be sent by a member school principal/athletic director to the KSHSAA and be approved by the KSHSAA, prior to the certification deadline.

- e. Hydration assessments may be conducted using either a refractometer or the KSHSAA Hydration Chart used in combination with reagent test strips.

ALL WEIGHT CERTIFICATION INFORMATION MUST BE SUBMITTED ONLINE BY AN ADMINISTRATOR. FOR COMPLETE DETAILS SEE THE WRESTLING MANUAL AND THE INSTRUCTIONS INCLUDED WITH THE WRESTLING EXAM.

3. MS/JH students participating in wrestling are not subject to mandatory hydration assessments during the interscholastic wrestling season. However, it is recommended students and coaches at this level of competition become familiar with the hydration assessment process.
4. The KSHSAA will provide to the administration of each KSHSAA member high school participating in wrestling several KSHSAA Urine Color Charts for use in hydration assessments. The KSHSAA will also provide reagent test strips for use in determining student hydration levels, if requested by the school.
5. The KSHSAA will provide the protocol for hydration assessments to each KSHSAA member high school participating in wrestling.

Rules for Accompanists

Sec. 8 Accompanists

- The same accompanist may not be used at two different music festival sites on the same day.
- It is strongly recommended that accompanists limit their events to less than 12.
- No accompanist may play for more than 22 events.
- There is no charge for piano or non-piano accompanists of vocal or instrumental entries.
- Important to accurately list your accompanists' names.
- Eliminating schedule conflicts depends on accuracy.

Accompaniment Rule for Music Festivals

Piano and other instrumental accompanists for vocal groups may be eligible students or adult musicians of the director's choice. Instrumental accompaniment shall not be considered part of the ensemble and should not influence the judging of the choral performance.

Intelligent accompaniments (e.g., Smart Music) will be allowed for solo performances only when a qualified accompanist is not available. Schools shall bring their own equipment to be used at the festivals, and the scheduled performance time limit must include the setting up and taking down of equipment. The intelligent accompaniment unit must be set on the interactive mode for all performances and the intelligent

accompaniment must follow the performer. It must be used as piano accompaniment only and is not to be used in orchestral or any other accompaniment modes. Non-interactive accompaniment recordings, such as CD or MIDI, etc., will not be allowed. Intelligent accompaniments should only be utilized as a last option when a qualified accompanist is not available.

Music Memorization Requirements

Instrumental soloists are not required to memorize their music for regional or state music festivals.

All piano and vocal soloists not memorizing their music at both regional and state music festivals will receive “comments only.”

Vocal and instrumental ensembles are not required to memorize music.

Performance Evaluation

KMEA has requested the following statements be adhered to by adjudicators in evaluating regional and state music festival performances:

1. Rate the performance on its merits, **not on potential**.
2. **Justify your ratings** with comments regardless of the rating assigned.
3. Take time to **review the justification paragraph and the ratings sheet**. Please refer to the information sent to you by the Kansas State High School Activities Association.

SCHOLARS BOWL

Volunteers to Serve on Question Committee

Each year approximately 30 individuals volunteer their time and service to the KSHSAA Scholars Bowl Question Validation Committee. These individuals screen, edit and place in priority questions from all subject areas for use in KSHSAA Regional and State Scholars Bowl Tournaments.

This year’s validation committee will meet Friday and Saturday, November 15 and 16 in the KSHSAA office in Topeka. Many schools provide release time to enable their scholars bowl coach to contribute to this important task.

Without the efforts of volunteers, scholars bowl could not occur without added expense to our member schools.

Final Entry Deadlines

Schools should note whether all entry requirements for scholars bowl regional assignments have been met. In order to be given a regional tournament assignment for the 2019 season schools must:

1. Have indicated participation on the ADM-1 form (was due in August) with payment of \$85 entry fees.

2. Submit to KSHSAA **online**, 35 questions from the seven subject areas by Friday, October 25, 2019 (see the *2019-20 Scholars Bowl Manual* for further instructions).

NOTE: An \$85 penalty will be assessed to those schools who do not submit questions by the October 25 deadline. **Schools not submitting questions prior to the deadline will not be given a regional tournament assignment. Only by paying a double entry fee will schools qualify for a regional assignment.** Assignments are listed in November on the KSHSAA website at www.khsaa.org.

SPIRIT

2019-20 NFHS Spirit Rules Interpretations

The National Federation of State High School Associations is the only source of official high school interpretations. They do not set aside nor modify any rule. They are made and published by the NFHS in response to situations presented.

1-Definitions: Dive Roll – An airborne forward roll where the feet of the performer are at or above the performer’s waist prior to the hands making contact with the performing surface. **Rationale:** Allows a slight point during a forward roll where the top person’s hands and feet are off of the ground at the same time. The requirement that the feet remain at or below the waist remove the ability to do a swan dive type of roll.

1-Definitions: Switch Up Liberty – A top person starts with one foot in a load, is tossed A stunt in which a top person starts with one foot on the ground, is released, and lands in a Liberty on the other foot vertical stunt on one foot or both feet. **Rationale:** A switch up skill can be performed to positions other than a liberty. Changing the label and the definition reflects the different body positions in which the top person can land.

2-1-5: ART. 5. Performing surfaces and areas must be suitable for spirit activities. a. Surfaces and areas must be reasonably free from objects and/or impediments. b. Stunts and tumbling must be modified to be appropriate for the surface and/or area and in relation to other participants. c. When discarding props that are made of hard material, or have corners or sharp edges, team members must gently toss or place the props. c. When using props that are made of hard material or have sharp corners or edges: 1. A top person may not release the props to the ground. 2. A person on the ground must gently toss or place the props. **Rationale:** Clarifies the disposal of signs and reduces risk by not having hard signs released from top persons in stunts.

3-1-8: ART. 8. Supports, braces, soft casts, etc., that are unaltered from the manufacturer’s original design/production do not require any additional padding. Supports/braces that have been altered from the manufacturer’s original design/production must be padded with a closed-cell, slow-recovery foam padding no less than one-half-inch thick if the participant is involved in partner stunts, pyramids or tosses. A participant wearing a plaster cast or a walking boot must not be involved in partner stunts, pyramids, or tosses, jumps, or tumbling. **Rationale:** Aligns with requirements for proper footwear.

3-2-7; 4-2-7: (P) ART 7. A spotter is required for extended stunts or transitions that stop in an extended position except for the following: a. Chair. b. Russian lift. c. Torch. d. Double-base split catch. d. e. Double-base vertical T-lift. e. f. Triple-base stunts in which the top person is horizontal. f. g. Triple-base suspended splits. g. h. Triple-base straddle sit provided the top person has both hands in contact with a post. **Rationale:** A torch is a prep level skill in which the top person’s foot is in the hands of the base, which requires a spotter. Having torch in this list of exceptions contradicts rules 3-2-8 and 4-2-8. Allowing a triple-base straddle sit without the criteria for a post or a spotter is just as safe as a triple-base suspended split without a spotter and

should not require additional stunt personnel for this skill as it does not cause an increased risk.

3-2-8; 4-2-8: (P) ART. 8. A spotter is required for tosses to single-base shoulder stands and single-base prep-level stunts in which the foot/feet of the top person are in the hands of the base and tosses to single-base shoulder stands. **Rationale:** Reworded for clarification. The previous wording was unclear as to whether the spotter was required for these two skills or for “tosses to single based shoulder stands and tosses to stunts where the feet were in the hands”. This clarifies that it is any time the feet are in the hands and also tosses to shoulders.

3-3-3: (P) ART. 3. Braced inversions in a pyramid that do not flip or roll are permitted provided the following conditions are met: a. The inverted top person shall have at least two bases or a base and a spotter. b. If the inverted top person is released the following conditions shall be met: 1. The skills/stunts before and after the release are permitted. 2. Each bracer is at prep level or below. If in a prep or shoulder stand, the bracer(s) shall have two bases or a base and a spotter. 3. The bracers do not provide primary support for the top person. 4. The top person and base(s) make no more than a ¼ turn around the bracer in a continuous movement. 5. The top person is caught by original base(s). When the catchers are not the original bases, the new catchers are in place when the transition is initiated, remain close to the original bases and are not part of any other skill. 6. The top person does not land in an inverted position. c. The top person must maintain hand-to-hand/arm contact with a bracer and at least one bracer maintains hand-to-hand/arm contact. **Rationale:** Allows the inversion to be caught by new catchers becoming consistent with other braced inversion rules that were changed in 2018. This rule was inadvertently overlooked when the revision occurred last year. The criteria states the new catchers have to remain close to the original bases and must be in place prior to the initiation of the inversion and does not increase the safety risk to the top person. The revision in Rule 3-3-3c helps clarify the intent of the rule and more accurately describes the connection required between the bracer and the top person.

3-3-5: (P) ART. 5. Braced flips in a pyramid are permitted provided all the following conditions are met: a. The top person maintains continuous hand-to-hand/arm contact with two bracers who are in multi-base preps with a spotter. Each arm is connected to/by a separate bracer. The top person is not behind the bracers. Both of the top person's hands/arms are in continuous contact with a bracer. b. Each bracer must be in a multi-base prep with a spotter. c. The top person must be to the side of or in front of the bracer(s). f. The bases/catchers remain stationary except as necessary for safety adjustments. **Rationale:** Safely allows similar visuals for smaller teams. This change allows a braced front flip performed just as it is on the ground, using one bracer behind the top person holding both hands (commonly called a “Baja”). This can currently be performed if another bracer is holding the wrist of the top person. That bracer is not necessary for this skill. Splitting out a, b, and c are editorial for clarity. (f) This rule is unnecessary with the change allowing the top person to change bases during the flip.

3-3-6; 4-3-6: (P) ART. 6. In all other inversions: a. Inversions may release to the following provided there is a spotter: 1. Non-inverted dismounts with no more than a ½ turn. 2. Loading position with no more than ½ turn. 3. A stunt at prep level or below any level with no twists. b. In inversions where the base of support begins and remains below prep level, at least one person shall maintain contact with the top person until the top person is no longer inverted or his/her hands are on the performing surface. c. In inversions where the base of support begins at or passes through prep level: 1. At least two people on the performing surface shall be in a position to protect the head/neck of the top person., one of whom must maintain contact with the top person's upper body (waist and above, which may include arms/hands) until the top person is no longer inverted or his/her hands are on the performing surface. The contact must be sufficient to stabilize/control the top person's position. 2. Contact must be maintained between at least one base and the top person's upper body, (waist and above, which may include arms/hands) until the top person is no longer inverted or their hands are on the performing surface. The contact must be sufficient to stabilize/control the top person's position.

EXCEPTION: A foldover that begins at or below prep level and does not stop in an extended position is allowed. When the catchers are

not the original bases, the new catchers shall be in place when the inversion is initiated, remain close to the original bases and are not part of any other skill.

Renumber current 2 and 3

Rationale: (a) Inversions releasing to extended level pose no additional risk than to prep level. When landing in a prep level skill, proper technique is to catch the skill in an extended position and bring it to prep level while balancing. (c) A top person can be in an inverted position while in contact with one person as long as two people are in a position to protect the head, neck, and shoulder area.

3-3-7; 4-3-7: ART. 7. An inverted top person must not hold objects (poms, signs, etc.) in his/her hands, except during a transition from an inverted position on the performing surface to a non-inverted stunt or from a prone position below prep level to a forward roll dismount.

Rationale: Allows the top person to hold objects while transitioning through an inverted position including from a prone position below prep level.

3-4-4: (P) ART. 7. A top person may be moved from a vertical position to a horizontal position (straight body) or cradle position provided all the following conditions are met:

- The top person maintains contact with at least one original base, post or spotter.
- At least two catchers and/or bases catch the upper body of the top person.
- The catchers must be to the side or front of the person(s) moving the top person.
- c. When the catchers are not the original bases, they remain close to the original bases and are in place prior to the movement to the horizontal position.

e d. When the catchers are not the original bases and the top person begins or passes through an extended overhead position, there are three catchers.

Delete 3-4-8, 3-4-9, 4-4-9, 4-4-10

Rationale: Both horizontal and straight body are redundant. C should be removed as pendulum type skills from an extended position have been allowed since 2015-16. Determining what is the side and front is sometimes difficult depending on the type of transition. This rule already includes criteria that new catchers must remain close to the original bases and are in place prior to the movement to the horizontal position, therefore making sure the top person is not transitioned to a horizontal position prior to the catchers being in place. We currently allow dismounts to new catchers and do not specify that the new catchers are to the side or front.

3-4-12; 4-4-5: (P) ART. 12. A flip from the performing surface that lands in a partner stunt or cradle is not permitted. **Rationale:** Redundant rule; it is a duplicate from the Tumbling rule 3-8-4 and 4-8-4.

3-5-4: (P) ART. 4. A switch liberty caught by the original bases is permitted as an exception to Articles 3-5-2 and 3-5-3. **Rationale:** This change in terms from “switch liberty” allows the top person to land on both feet instead of just one. This clarification of the intent of the previous rule is that switch ups cannot be caught by new bases, but must be caught by the original bases.

3-5-5: (P) ART. 5. Release transitions are permitted provided all of the following conditions are met throughout the transition: a. The skills/stunts before and after the release are permitted. B. The top person maintains hand-to-hand/arm contact with at least one bracer and at least one bracer maintains hand-to-hand/arm contact except for the following skills, in which the top person may not change bases: 1. A non-braced top person in a vertical position at prep level or above may be released to a stunt at any level provided the top person remains vertical in a position where the upper body remains vertical and the legs are not in a seated/piked position. Vertical releases from an extended position to an extended position may not perform more than a

¼ twist. 2. A non-braced top person in a cradle position or horizontal position at prep level or below may be released to a loading position or stunt prep level or below. c. Each bracer is at prep level or below. If in a prep or shoulder stand, the bracer(s) shall have two bases or a base and a spotter. d. The bracers do not provide primary support for the top person. e. The released top person and base(s) make no more than a ¼ turn around the bracer in a continuous movement in which the top person remains vertical over the base(s). f. When the catchers are not the original bases, the new catchers are in place when the transition is initiated, remain close to the original bases and are not part of any other skill. **Rationale:** (b) The revision helps clarify the intent of the rule and more accurately describes the connection required between the bracer and the top person. This does not change the intent of the rule. (b1) Clarifies what positions the top person can be in when performing the release. Allowing vertical releases to begin at prep or above allows more skills without increasing risk. The high to high release is further limited to only a ¼ rotation to allow a small pop to arabesque, but not a fully released high to high full around. (e) Is now aligned with rule 3-5-5 allowing a change of bases, but not requiring the top person to remain vertical over their original bases.

3-6-2; 4-6-2: (P) ART. 2. Non-braced suspended splits that originate from or pass through prep level or above are permitted provided all the following conditions are met: b. The top person has both hands in contact with a base(s) once she reaches the full split position.

EXCEPTION: Top person may release one hand to grasp the hand of another base, post, or bracer to adjust his/her position. **Rationale:** Allows a top person in a suspended split to release a base or a post in order to connect to a bracer.

3-6-3; 4-6-3: (P) ART. 3. Braced suspended splits are permitted provided all the following conditions are met: a. The top person has at least two bases. b. The top person has both hands in contact with the bracer(s) and at least one bracer maintains continuous hand-to-hand/arm contact. c. The top person and bracer(s) each have a separate spotter with the exception of bracers in shoulder sits or thigh stands. d. The bracer(s) maintain hand/arm contact with the top person until he/she is no longer in a split position. **Rationale:** The connection wording change in (b) is in keeping with others submitted. (c) is unnecessary for a braced connection that doesn't release and is not required elsewhere in the rules. (d) Is unnecessary wording. The skill is performed with and without this requirement without issue and follows proper technique.

3-7-9: ART. 9. In cradle dismounts where a bracer is involved after the bases release the top person, all the following conditions must be met: c. Each top person and bracer has a separate spotter with the exception of bracers in double based preps, shoulder sits or thigh stands. d. The bracers do not provide primary support for the top person and remain in place during the dismount. e. The release is a continuous vertical up-and-down movement in which the top person remains over the original base(s). The top person makes no more ¼ around the bracer in a continuous movement. f. When the top person is not released to new catchers, the catchers must be in place prior to the initiation of the release and are not part of any other skill. g. Bases and remain in place during the dismount. **Rationale:** (c) Allowing bracers to be in a double base prep without a spotter is safe. Currently, braced transitions are allowed with a bracer in a prep without a spotter. This would further a line releases and dismounts that involve a bracer. (e) This allows for a ¼ turn around the bracer to a cradle dismount, much like a release transition to a stunt. (f) Allowing the top person to be caught by new catcher who are in place and not involved in any other skill prior to the initiation of the dismount does not increase safety risk for the top person, as this is allowed to a stunt in rule 3-5-5.

4-3-3: (P) ART. 3. Braced inversions in a pyramid that do not flip or roll are permitted provided the following conditions are met: c. The top person must maintain head-to-hand/arm contact with a bracer. c. The top person and at least one bracer maintain a hand-to-hand/arm contact. **Rationale:** The revision helps clarify the intent of the rule and more accurately describes the connection required between the bracer and the top person.

4-4-3: (P) ART. 3. A participant must not move over or be under a partner stunt or pyramid except when helping build, stabilize or dismount that partner stunt or pyramid. Partner stunts and pyramids may not pass

over, under or through other partner stunts or pyramids. **Rationale:** Dance only change, which allows a dancer to walk under a pyramid connection or a stunt provided they are not the required spotter and does not increase safety risk.

4-4-4: (P) ART. 4. A top person may be moved from a vertical position to a horizontal or cradle position provided all the following conditions are met: d. The catchers are to the side or front of the person(s) moving the top person. d. e. When the catchers are not the original bases, they remain close to the original bases and are in place prior to the movement to the horizontal position. **Rationale:** Pendulum type skills from an extended position have been allowed since 2015-16. Determining what is the side and front is sometimes difficult depending on the type of transition. This rule already includes criteria that new catcher have to remain close to the original bases and are in place prior to the movement to the horizontal position, therefore making sure the top person is not transitioned to an horizontal position prior to the catchers being in place. We currently allow dismounts to new catchers and do not specify where the new catcher have to be.

4-5-3: (P) ART. 3. Non-braced release stunts and transitions are permitted: a. The top person must begin and end at prep level or below. The top person may begin and end in a vertical or horizontal position or a cradle. **Rationale:** The current rule contradicts Rule 4-4-4b, a top person cannot be released to a horizontal position from prep level. This change removes the contradiction.

Spirit Points of Emphasis

Rule 2-1-12: Spirit participants must not stand behind the free throw lane extended during a basketball game.

Rule 2-1-10: Spirit participants must remain outside the playing area during a 30-second time-out in a basketball game.

There are three situations which are illegal by Kansas rules and more restrictive than the NFHS:

SITUATION 1. All basket tosses and/or quick load-in tosses are illegal regardless of performing surface.

SITUATION 2. A flyer while suspended mid-air may NOT hold anything in their hands.

SITUATION 3. Pyramids may NOT be more than two persons high.

Mascots

Non Cheer Team Member Mascots

Mascots that are not members of the school's cheer squad are NOT covered by catastrophic insurance and they do not have to meet eligibility requirements. A non cheer team member mascot may never step foot on a playing surface until the end of a game (i.e. basketball court, football playing field).

Cheer Team Member Mascot

Mascots that are bona-fide members of the school's cheer team are covered by catastrophic insurance. A school would need to submit them on their online eligibility report, and the student would be required to have a physical on file. These mascots must be full-time students at their school. Cheer team member mascots are allowed on a playing surface just like cheerleaders.

Mascots may NEVER stunt or spot.

Megaphone Usage

Megaphones are treated the same as noisemakers. All musical instruments including drums are treated the same as noisemakers.

In basketball, noisemakers/megaphones may be used by cheerleaders/student body (if the local school administration allows this) only before the game, between quarters, at half-time, during time-outs and after the game. No other time is acceptable. It doesn't matter if the clock is running or not. Cheerleaders have been instructed to only use megaphones directed toward their crowd.

Megaphones or other noisemakers may NEVER be pounded on the floor or other surface as these may damage host facilities.

While I'm going there, I'll also mention sports are something that can keep kids out of trouble as well. If they are not at practice during the day, it allows for opportunities to hang with the wrong crowd or fall into the ills of today's society.

But an athlete doesn't have to be the best in the world to get benefits of sports. Just being part of a team is something special for some teens, and it gives them a sense of belonging. It also just might provide a family atmosphere that's missing in someone's life.

Don't get me wrong: Sports are not everything, and parents should allow their children to experience the successes and failures associated with games. In some places, sports are given too much of a priority, as is winning.

But that's not a sports problem, that's a problem with parents and society.

Don't discount that little sophomore out on the football field late in the fourth quarter of a blowout loss. While it might not be a big deal for some, it's a huge deal for him.

If you don't think so, just go to a football game on a Friday night and watch the players on the field — and those on the bench. Go cheer on the underdogs, and root for the powerhouses.

I've seen kids try out for teams and not make it and be crushed. I've seen kids make teams because of their last name and they couldn't tie their own shoes. It's also exactly the way life is in the real world.

People are going to be afforded luxuries others aren't given a chance to, and some are going to have to bust their behinds to get ahead in life. It's just like sports.

Giving kids every chance to succeed in life should be priority No. 1 — whether it be on the field or in the classroom. Sometimes that field is the classroom.

There is more to life than sports, but don't discount how important lessons learned in sports are important. If you ask me, there should be more teams available for kids to play on in elementary through high school.

And if they are given that opportunity at a young age, when they grow up, they'll realize it's more than just sports.

Following the Call to Order by President Alan Stein and the roll call, B. Lewis moved, second by S. Reed, to approve the Minutes of the April 26, 2019, Board of Directors meeting. The motion passed (67-0).

All agenda items passed become effective immediately upon publication of these minutes unless otherwise specified.

NOTE: Words or phrases which appear underlined in the following sections indicate the changes which were made to existing handbook rules

CLASS 1A CLASSIFICATION CHANGES TO BE VOTED ON BY MEMBER SCHOOLS

A proposal was made to modify **Rule 5, Classification of Senior High Schools, Section 2, Article 1** as follows:

30—Board Minutes

CLASSIFICATION CHANGES FOR PRIVATE SCHOOLS DENIED

A proposal was made to modify **Rule 5, Classification of Senior High Schools** as follows:

Rule 5

Classification of Senior High Schools

Section 1: General Regulations

Art. 1: Private schools are defined as a school that can decline admission/enrollment to a student that resides within that school's Public School district or designated geographic area.

Art. 2: Private schools involved in a Cooperative Agreement, under the provisions of Rule 29, with a member Public School shall be allowed to participate in the Public School postseason tournament provided the member Public School is listed as the designee to administer the program. This exception shall not include Quasi-team/individual athletics.

Section 2: Senior Public High Regulations

Art. 1: All member senior high schools shall be divided into six classes-6A, 5A, 4A, 3A, 2A and 1A. Class 6A shall include the thirty-six (36) high schools with the largest enrollments; Class 5A the next thirty-six (36); 4A the next thirty-six (36); 3A the next sixty-four (64); 2A the next sixty-four (64); and Class 1A, the remainder.

FOOTBALL EXCEPTION: Classifications for the purpose of determining district football assignments, shall be based on the total enrollment in the school's ninth, tenth and eleventh grades as submitted to the KSHSAA on the date established by state statute for official enrollment. (Exception: See Note in Article 3 below for football classification procedure for USD #207 and USD #453.)

For the purpose of district football, utilizing this exception, member schools will be classified as follows:

Class 6A: 32 largest member schools playing 11-Player football

Class 5A: 32 next largest member schools playing 11-Player football

Class 4A: 32 next largest member schools playing 11-Player football

Class 3A: 48 next largest member schools playing 11-Player football

Class 2A: 48 next largest member schools playing 11-Player football

Class 1A: All other member schools playing 11-Player football

8-Player: Participating schools will be assigned to two separate Divisions, as established by the Executive Board

NOTE: For 8-Player district football participation, assignments shall be limited to those schools with a maximum enrollment of 100 students in grades 9, 10 and 11. (*See Rule 35-2-3, Football.*) Schools not requesting a football district assignment will have their position filled in each category by the next school moving up in enrollment.

Art. 2: If two or more schools have identical enrollments and

are on the lower end of a Class division, the school(s) having the larger enrollment the previous year(s) shall be assigned to the higher classification.

Art. 3: Annual classifications (except football), shall be determined by the total enrollment in the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades as of the date established by state statute for official enrollment. Students who are on the school rolls as of that date must be counted.

NOTE: K.S.A. 72-5333b does not permit USD #207, Fort Leavenworth school district to offer or operate grades 10 through 12. To accommodate high school participation of 9th grade students attending Patton Junior High in Fort Leavenworth - the annual and football classification count of USD #453 Leavenworth High School shall include the count of 9th grade students attending Fort Leavenworth-Patton Junior High School according to the following formula:

Determine the percentage of Patton Junior High students entering Leavenworth High School as 10th graders during the previous four-year period. This number shall determine the percentage of USD #207 9th graders to be included in USD #453's classification count for annual and football classification.

Art. 4: Any student, including special education, enrolled in five or more subjects of unit weight, shall be counted as a full-time student for classification purposes. A subject of unit weight shall be defined as per that established by the Kansas State Board of Education. (See Rule 13, Scholarship Requirements.)

Section 3: Senior Private High Regulations

Art. 1: All member private high schools shall compete in separate postseason tournament(s) from public school members.

FOOTBALL EXCEPTION: Classifications, for the purpose of determining district football assignments, shall be based on the total enrollment in the school's ninth, tenth and eleventh grades as submitted to the KSHSAA on the date established by state statute for official enrollment.

NOTE: For 8-Player district football participation, assignments shall be limited to those schools with a maximum enrollment of 100 students in grades 9, 10 and 11. (*See Rule 35-2-3, Football.*) Schools not requesting a football district assignment will have their position filled in each category by the next school moving up in enrollment.

Art. 2: If two or more schools have identical enrollments and are on the lower end of a Class division, the school(s) having the larger enrollment the previous year(s) shall be assigned to the higher classification.

Art. 3: Annual classifications (except football), shall be determined by the total enrollment in the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades as of the date established by state statute for official enrollment. Students who are on the school rolls as of that date must be counted.

Art. 4: Any student, including special education, enrolled in five or more subjects of unit weight, shall be counted as a full-time student for classification purposes. A subject of unit weight shall be defined as per that established by the Kansas State Board of Education. (See Rule 13, Scholarship Requirements.)

Section 4: Middle/Junior High School Regulations (none)

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J. Hines moved adoption of the proposal for the 2020-21 school year, second by K. Whitaker. A motion was made by J. Hines, second by K. Whitaker for a roll call vote. The roll call vote was denied with 17 in favor and 50 opposed. The original motion was then denied by a vote of 21 in favor, 46 opposed.

RULES 15 AND 18 MODIFIED TO EXPAND HIGH SCHOOL ELIGIBILITY WAITING PERIOD TO ONE CALENDAR YEAR BEGINNING IN 2020-21

A proposal was made to modify Rule 15, Enrollment, Section 1, Articles 2 & 4 and Rule 18, Transfer, Sections 1-2, as follows:

Rule 15 Enrollment/Attendance

Section 1: General Regulations (apply to grades 7-12)

Art. 2: A student who attends one class after enrolling is considered in attendance. Attending a class the opening day of school which is called for the purpose of organization or assignment, counts as attendance. If a student transfers to a new school, enrolls and attends one class, as indicated above, and then goes back to the former school, the student may not become eligible until after eighteen weeks-one calendar year in accordance with the provisions of the Transfer Rule. (Exception: See *Rule 18-1-9, Transfer*.)

Art. 3: If a student repeats subjects previously passed and is not enrolled in at least five new subjects (those not previously passed) of unit weight, or its equivalency, then that semester does not count as a semester of attendance under provisions of the Semester Requirements Rule and would not be considered a last semester of attendance, as noted in the Scholarship Requirements Rule. (Such a student is not eligible to represent a school in interschool activities during a repeat semester.) (See *Rule 13-1-3, Scholarship Requirements*.)

Art. 4: Students who must attend eighteen weeks-one calendar year to become eligible shall not participate until after they have attended classes on Monday for the first day of school in the nineteenth week the first day following one calendar year from the date of transfer.

Rule 18 Transfer

PURPOSE—The purpose of the Transfer Rule is to protect students from being displaced by those who change schools for interscholastic activity reasons. It is devised to eliminate “school shopping” after a student has initially chosen the school of his/her choice. This avoids transfers when the motivation is for activity purposes and prohibits recruitment. Students transferring who do not meet the criteria or one of the exceptions listed in Sections 1, 2 or 3, would otherwise be taking the place of a student in interscholastic competition who has met those requirements.

NOTE: In addition to the transfer rule, the student must meet all other rules and regulations, such as Age, Scholarship, Bona Fide Student in Good Standing, etc.

A student is eligible transfer-wise if:

- BEGINNING SEVENTH GRADER—A seventh grader, at the beginning of his or her seventh grade year, is eligible under the **Transfer Rule** at any school he or she may choose to attend.
- BEGINNING NINTH GRADERS IN A THREE-YEAR JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL—So that ninth graders of a three-year junior high are treated equally to ninth graders of a four-year senior high school, a student who has successfully completed the eighth grade of a two-year middle/junior high school, may transfer to the ninth grade of a three-year junior high school at the beginning of the school year and be eligible immediately under the Transfer Rule. Such a ninth grader must then, as a tenth grader, attend the feeder senior high school of their school system. Should they attend a different school as a tenth grader, they would be ineligible for eighteen weeks-one calendar year.
- ENTERING HIGH SCHOOL FOR THE FIRST TIME—A senior high student is eligible under the Transfer Rule at any senior high school he or she may choose to attend at when senior high school is entered for the first time at the beginning of the school year.
- BONA FIDE MOVE—If a student's parents, or legal guardian in case neither parent is living, make a bona fide move to a new permanent residence in the vicinity of the new school to which the student transfers, the student is then immediately eligible. If the parents' move occurs during the school year, see **Sec. 1, Art. 9**, for other timing factors.
- Guardianship Definition**—The term “guardianship,” while either parent is living, is not recognized for eligibility purposes. Only those appointed by the courts to a full personal and estate guardianship are recognized if both parents are deceased.
- Vicinity Definition**—The term “vicinity” is when a student continues to reside with his or her parents and commutes daily to and from school.

A student is ineligible if:

- CHANGE IN SCHOOL IS MADE WITHOUT AN ACCOMPANYING MOVE ON THE PART OF THE STUDENT'S PARENTS—If students change schools without an accompanying move on the part of their parents, they will be ineligible for interschool extracurricular activities for eighteen weeks-one calendar year, beginning with the first day of their attendance.

- INDEPENDENT STUDENTS—A student who is “on his or her own” and not dependent upon parents or a guardian for a home and who transfers from one school to another is required to attend eighteen weeks-one calendar year before becoming eligible.

FOR EXCEPTIONS AND ADDITIONAL INFORMATION REFER TO SECTIONS 1, 2 and 3.

Section 1: General Regulations (apply to grades 7-12)

Art. 1: USE OF FORMS—In transferring from one middle/junior or senior high school to another, each receiving school shall process and have on record a Certificate of Transfer (form T-E, T-E/P, FES, or T-E/H found online at www.khsaa.org) on behalf of each student, showing eligibility status, and a record of participation in interschool activities.

Art. 2: EIGHTEEN WEEKS ONE CALENDAR YEAR DEFINED—Students who must attend eighteen weeks-one calendar year to become eligible shall not participate until they have attended classes on Monday for the first day of school in the nineteenth week the first day following one calendar year from the date of transfer.

Bylaw Article XIII states in part:

A partial week of school (which includes at least three days attendance) caused by holidays, teachers' meetings, or any emergency, may count as one full week of school toward the eighteen weeks attendance requirement. Two or three partial weeks of school with a total accumulation of three days may be counted as one week's attendance.

Art. 3: STUDENTS DEPENDENT UPON OTHER FAMILIES—The Executive Board may sanction the eligibility of students who move with families upon whom they have been continuously dependent for at least one year and with whom they have made their homes.

Art. 4: TRANSFER FROM NON-MEMBER SCHOOL—Students who transfer from a school which is not a member of the KHSAA or an Association of any state as recognized by the National Federation of State Associations, may be declared eligible by the Executive Board. (Process Form T-E—Send a copy of it and a letter of request for eligibility to KHSAA, identifying the non-member school.)

Art. 5: SPECIAL TRANSFERS—Students who transfer from one attendance center to another within the same unified district (USD) when initiated by the school, may be declared eligible without a move on the part of the parents, provided policies on such transfers are clearly defined in board of education policy and provided both principals approve the “special” transfer. (Process Form T-E—KHSAA need not be involved unless a disagreement occurs.)

Art. 6: POSSIBLE LIMITED ELIGIBILITY—When a student transfers schools under circumstances which do not meet other terms of the Transfer Rule, he/she may be granted eligibility to participate in interscholastic activities as hereinafter restricted if the student qualifies under the following terms and conditions:

- A student whose name was included on a school eligibility roster at any level (varsity, junior varsity, freshman, middle/junior high, etc.) for a given activity during the twelve calendar months preceding the date of such transfer can be eligible only for non-varsity competition in that activity.
- A student may have unrestricted eligibility in all other activities in which his/her name has not appeared on a school eligibility roster (at any level). Eligibility can be granted provided the activity eligibility is approved by the principals of both the sending and receiving schools and the KHSAA Executive Board, and further, provided there is no activity purpose involved in the transfer. Approval must be granted on a special KHSAA form (form T-E/P).
- The student shall be ineligible for all activities for eighteen weeks-one calendar year from the date of transfer in the event either or both principals or the Executive Board declines to approve activity eligibility.

Art. 7: DISCONTINUED SCHOOLS—Any student transferring from a closed or discontinued school shall be eligible

for interschool activities immediately upon enrollment in another school, provided he or she attends a school in the vicinity of his or her home which is close enough so the student may continue to reside at home. (Process Form T-E.)

Art. 8: OFFICIAL CHANGE IN DISTRICT BOUNDARIES—Any student who transfers to another school because of a definite official change in school district boundaries shall be eligible upon enrollment, provided transfer is made to the school into which district his or her home has been annexed, and provided enrollment in such school is not later than the opening of the school year following the official change of school boundaries. (Process Form T-E.)

Art. 9: MOVE OF PARENTS TO NEW SCHOOL AREA—If a student's parents move to the vicinity of a new school and the student elects to remain at the school in which he or she has been enrolled and attending, the student may do so without affecting his or her eligibility at that school.

If the parents move during the school year and the student wishes to transfer to the school in the vicinity of the new permanent residence, he or she may become eligible immediately under the following conditions: (Process Form T-E.)

- If the student transfers within ten days of the time of his or her parents' move, the student becomes eligible at once as far as the Transfer Rule is concerned.
- If the student remains until the close of the current semester or until the close of the school year, he or she may become eligible immediately upon enrolling in the new school and attending classes.

- If the student transfers within ten days after the end of an activity season in which he or she competed and which was in progress at the time of the parents' move, the student becomes eligible immediately. An activity season is interpreted as being “in progress” after a school has been represented in at least one interschool event in that activity.

NOTE: If a student does not transfer to the new school within the time span as explained above in a, b, or c, the student will remain eligible at the original school but would be ineligible at the new school, unless otherwise approved by the school from which he or she transferred and the Executive Board.

Art. 10: TRANSFERRING BACK TO HOME SCHOOL—If a student has lived and attended school away from home, he or she shall be eligible for interschool activities upon returning home and attending the home school (the school the student previously attended, if there has been no change in family residence), provided the student meets all other general eligibility requirements. (Process Form T-E.)

NOTE: Questionable cases must be submitted to the Executive Board.

Art. 11: PARENTS MOVE TO CREATE ELIGIBILITY—A student who transfers from one school to another before or without regard to a move by his or her parents, does not become eligible if the parents move later for the purpose of making the student eligible. If the move was contemplated and the change in schools made for some justifiable reason (home under construction, but not finished; impending job transfer; etc.), such as starting a new semester, a student

may be declared eligible as soon as the new family home has been established. (*Process Form TE*.)

Art. 12: FOREIGN STUDENTS—

a. A student from a foreign country who attends a member school as the result of participation in a foreign exchange academic program which has been approved by the Executive Board and which student meets all other eligibility requirements shall not be considered a transfer student during his or her first academy year of attendance. Such a student is eligible for participation during the first year of academic attendance if Form FES (found online at www.kshsaa.org) is completed, filed with the Executive Director and approved before participation.

b. Should a student from a foreign country attend a member school, but not as the result of participation in a foreign exchange academic program approved by the Executive Board, or attend a second academic year, regardless of the length of attendance in the first academic year, that student shall, for purposes of this rule, be treated as all other students who change schools. If there is not an accompanying move on the part of the student's parents, the student will be ineligible for interschool extracurricular activities for ~~eighteen weeks-one calendar year~~, beginning with the first day of his or her attendance.

Art. 13: HARDSHIP—This rule applies only to transfer students who, because of unforeseen, unavoidable, or unusual circumstances, including but not limited to, broken home conditions, death of parents or guardian and abandonment, find it necessary to change schools.

In accordance with K.S.A. 72-6001, the KSHSAA recognizes hardship transfer status for children of active duty military personnel who qualify per the requirements of the "Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children."

The situation may be referred to the Executive Board for evaluation by completing Form T-E/H from the Entry Forms (online).

The Executive Board may declare the student eligible, provided the change was necessary and there was no undue influence.

If the Executive Board declares the student eligible under the foregoing circumstances, he or she shall be eligible upon notification.

Art. 14: BOARDING SCHOOLS—A boarding school which has a significant number of foreign students enrolled may play soccer in the fall and/or spring seasons without the ~~eighteen weeks-one calendar year~~ waiting period being enforced for these foreign students. Such a team may not compete in a KSHSAA postseason tournament.

Section 2: Senior High Regulations

Art. 1: ENTERING HIGH SCHOOL FOR THE FIRST TIME
—A senior high student is eligible at any senior high school he or she may choose to attend when senior high is entered for the first time at the beginning of the school year.

Art. 2: CHANGING SCHOOLS AFTER INITIAL YEAR—After a student is eligible in his or her initial year of senior high school, he or she may not change schools without forfeiting

~~eighteen weeks-one calendar year~~ of eligibility, unless there is a bona fide move on the part of the student's parents to a permanent residence in the vicinity of the new school to which the student transfers.

Art. 3: NON-FOUR-YEAR HIGH SCHOOL—Students who complete the course of a high school that does not offer a full four-year course may transfer to a secondary school in the vicinity of their home, where they may continue their education and become eligible immediately.

Section 3: Middle/Junior High School Regulations

Art. 2: CHANGING SCHOOLS AFTER INITIAL YEAR—After a student is eligible as a seventh grader, or in his or her initial year of middle/junior high school, he or she may not change middle/junior high schools without forfeiting ~~eighteen weeks-one calendar year~~ (*NOTE: SEE AMENDMENT BELOW*) of eligibility, unless there is a bona fide move on the part of the student's parents to a permanent residence in the vicinity of the new school to which the student transfers.

Motion for adoption of the proposal as written was made by P. Lane, second by D. Thon. An amendment was made by J. Hines, second by S. Boden, to leave the Middle/Junior High regulation in **Rule 18, Section 3, Article 2** as currently written at 18 weeks. The amendment was approved by a vote of 53 in favor, 13 opposed. An amendment was made by T. Bumgarner, second by M. Graber, to adopt the changes for high schools beginning with the 2020-21 school year. The implementation date amendment was approved by a vote of 62 in favor, 4 opposed. The original proposal (with amendments included) was adopted as amended, 42 in favor, 24 opposed.

OUTSIDE COMPETITION RULE UPDATED TO REFLECT CALENDAR

A proposal was made to modify **Rule 22, Outside Competition, Section 1, Article 1** as follows:

Rule 22

Outside Competition

Section 1: General Regulations

Art. 1: A student who is a member of a school athletic scholars bowl or debate squad effective ~~Friday following Labor Day Monday SCW #7~~ through Friday preceding Memorial Day may not participate as a member of an outside team or as an independent competitor in the same sport, scholars bowl or debate activity. (*Exception: See Rule 4, United States Olympic Committee-Sponsored National Trials and Competitions.*)

M. Kastle moved adoption of the proposal, second by B. Lewis. The vote was 66 in favor, none opposed.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT RULE MODIFIED FOR

QUASI-TEAM/INDIVIDUAL ACTIVITIES

A proposal was made to modify **Rule 29, Cooperative Agreement, Section 2, Article 1(a)** as follows:

Rule 29

Cooperative Agreement Section 2: Senior High Regulations

Art. 1: With the consent of the Executive Board, ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grade students from member schools may be combined for interscholastic activity competition and field a common participating group.

a. When fielding a common participating group, no more than two (2) member schools may be combined to compete, and the classification appropriate for the combined enrollment of the schools involved will apply.

(1) The KSHSAA Executive Board may waive the number of schools that may be combined when the schools are within the same school district.

(2) For interscholastic music activities, the KSHSAA Executive Board may waive the number of non-district schools that may be combined. Before a cooperative interscholastic music agreement may be established, a hearing with the Executive Board and the participating schools is required.

(3) For Quasi-team/Individual athletics, the KSHSAA Executive Board may grant a request for ~~no more than three (3) multiple~~ schools to be combined. Before a Quasi-team/Individual cooperative agreement may be established, a hearing with the Executive Board and participating schools is required.

R. Schneebarger moved adoption of the proposal, second by B. Lewis. The vote was 66 in favor, none opposed.

TENNIS RULE LANGUAGE MODIFIED

A proposal was made to modify the language for **Rule 41, Tennis (Girls & Boys), Section 2, Articles 3-6** as follows:

Rule 41

Tennis (Girls & Boys)

Section 2: Senior High Regulations

Art. 3: The state tournament

a. Girls – The Executive Board shall establish the state tournament during Standardized Calendar Week #15. Regional tournaments, when needed, will be held ~~Saturday during SCW #14~~. In classification groups of 33 or more schools, a two day regional tournament will be conducted ~~on Friday & Saturday of during~~ SCW #14.

b. Boys – The Executive Board shall establish the state tournament during Standardized Calendar Week #45. Regional tournaments, when needed, will be held during SCW #44. In classification groups of 33 or more schools, a two day regional tournament will be conducted during SCW #44.

~~Art. 4: The Executive Board may schedule summer tournaments if a sufficient number of schools enter summer competition.~~
~~a. A school shall not participate during the school year and in summer competition.~~
~~b. A school shall declare its choice in advance.~~

Art. 5: 4: No student representing a member school shall participate in more than eight days of interschool competition during a season, exclusive of regional, sub-state and state tournaments.

a. Two dual meets may be substituted for one day of tournament competition provided no loss of instructional time would take place for competition and/or travel.

b. Schools are encouraged to schedule as many quadragular or smaller events as possible. It is recommended these events start after school hours.

c. On those days when school time is used, only two matches or tournaments may start prior to 3 p.m. C.T.
~~Art. 6: The regional winners of first, second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth places in both singles and doubles shall qualify for the state tournament series.~~

~~a. No school may be represented by more than two contestants in the singles matches and not more than two teams in the doubles matches.~~

~~b. A student may not represent a school in both singles and doubles matches.~~

The language has been inserted in the *Tennis Manual* and was obsolete in the Handbook, consistent with other KSHSAA rules. R. Morrissey moved adoption of the modification, second by J. Vanek. The vote was 66 in favor, none opposed.

MIDDLE SCHOOL TRACK & FIELD COMPETITION CHANGE DENIED

A proposal was made to modify **Rule 42, Track & Field (Girls & Boys), Section 3, Article 1** as follows:

Rule 42

Track & Field (Girls & Boys)

Section 3: Middle/Junior High Regulations

Art. 1: No student shall participate in more than seven days of competition during a season.

~~a. On those days when school time is used, only two competitions may start prior to 3 p.m. C.T.~~

EXCEPTION: Ninth grade students in junior high schools shall be permitted to compete in the same number of athletic competitions as ninth graders in senior high schools.

The proposal failed due to a lack of a motion.

BOWLING RULE LANGUAGE MODIFIED

A proposal was made to modify the language for **Rule 45, Bowling (Girls & Boys), Section 2, Articles 4-6** as follows:

Rule 45

Bowling (Girls & Boys)

Section 2: Senior High Regulations

Art. 1: Practice shall not begin prior to January 1 of each calendar year.

Art. 2: The state tournament shall be held during Standardized Calendar Week #35. Regionals, when needed, will be held the previous week.

Art. 3: No student representing a member school shall participate in more than 10 days of competition during a season, exclusive of regional and state tournaments.

Art. 4: Member schools may enter a maximum of six players in one of the state tournament series.

Art. 5: If a team qualifies for the state tournament, all six members shall qualify.

Art. 6: If a school enters fewer than four players, they shall compete for individual medalist honors.

Art. 7: After three games of medal competition in state tournaments, championships will be awarded for low medalist and for the low medalist six-member team.

NOTE: Ties for team awards and medalist honors will be decided by tie-breaking procedures adopted by the Executive Board.

Art. 8: The Executive Board has the authority to revise the participation regulations and to establish regulations for outside tournament competition.

The language has been inserted in the Bowling Manual and was obsolete in the Handbook, consistent with other KSHSAA rules. P. McComas moved adoption of the modification, second by G. Rosenhagen. The vote was 66 in favor, none opposed.

COMPETITION LIMIT CHANGE APPROVED FOR SCHOLARS BOWL

A proposal was made to change the language for **Rule 51, Scholars Bowl, Section 2, Article 3** as follows:

Rule 51 Scholars Bowl Section 2: Senior High Regulations

Art. 3: No student may participate in more than eight-nine scholars bowl competitions per year, exclusive of regional and state. On those days when school time is used, only two competitions may start prior to 3 p.m. C.T.

NOTE: Each student is limited to eight scholars bowl competitions, except that should his or her school host a league or invitational tournament, then he or she may participate in nine scholars bowl competitions. If a school attempts to host a tournament and is unable to do so, it may appeal to the Executive Board for a waiver of this regulation to permit its students to enter nine scholars bowl competitions.

B. Lewis moved adoption of the proposal beginning with the 2020-21 school year, second by M. Straub. The vote was 66 in favor, none opposed.

Purpose of Appeal:

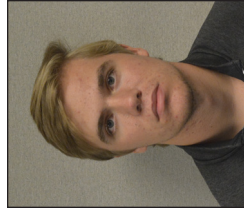

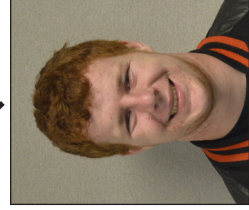

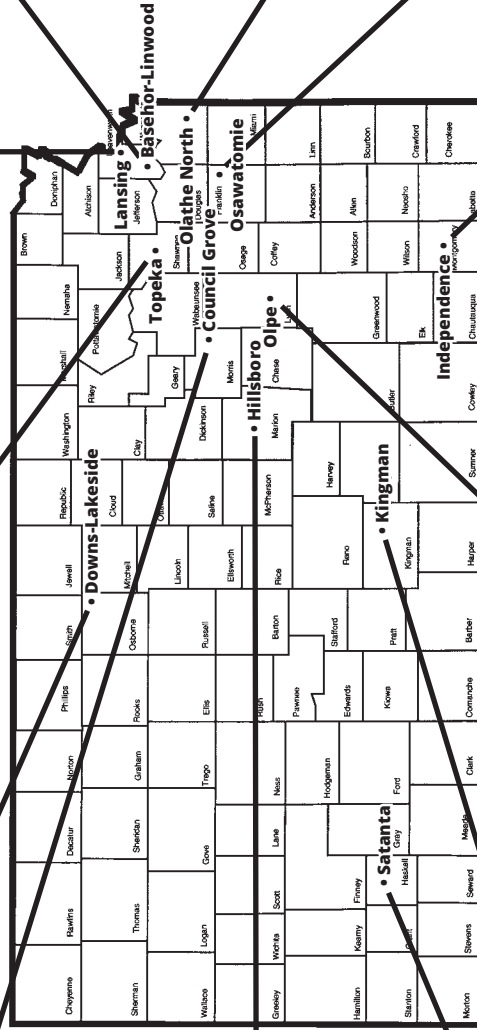
