KRIS TRIMMER NAMED 2017 EARL REUM—KANSAS ADVISOR OF THE YEAR



Kris Trimmer has been a Social Studies Teacher for twenty-five years, the last 20 at Winfield High School in Winfield, Kan-

sas. For the last eleven plus years she has also been the "Vikings" Student Council Advisor. Kris Trimmer established a Leadership Class where she teaches students that there are five categories of leadership, communication skills, group processes, managerial skills, self-awareness and human relations skills and are given the opportunity to practice those leadership skills in situations that really matter.

Winfield High School's Student Council Executive Officers say, "As student leaders, she supports us by allowing the student to lead, not the advisors. She has taught us to deal with challenges including working with students with different personality styles. She guides us to effective conflict resolution, considering individual strengths and weaknesses."

Mrs. Trimmer and Winfield High School have served as a host for many KSHSAA Regional Conferences and has been a huge support of the KSHSAA Summer Leadership Workshop by sending students each and every year, with some of them returning as Junior Councilors.



Winfield High School's Principal, Trenton Creeden, stated, "Mrs.

Trimmer is very active in student life at Winfield High School. She either has or has had her hand in about everything that we do here. The climate of our building has been impacted by her leadership and direction. She is a student advocate in every way."



When asked about her work as a student council advisor, Kris said, "I love to watch new student council members

getting to know each other.

We use the 'color test' from summer camp to gather information about each member. It allows them to learn about themselves and it also makes it possible to know how to work together. A successful student council is certainly a study in psychology. How to get along with people is a skill that will serve them well in life."

"Dr. Earl Reum, Mr. Student Council, once said, 'Great leaders are developed, not simply born!' This is what student council is all about. In fact, if it is a skill that is necessary for success in the future, student council has it covered."

STUDENT ADVISORY TEAM APPLICATIONS

In 1996, the KSHSAA Executive Board approved the formation of a Student Advisory Team (SAT) to represent the student's voice in Association governance. The role of the committee is to:

- Receive information and provide input to the Executive Board, Board of Directors, and Association staff regarding KSHSAA issues.
- Serve as a sounding board on proposals affecting students.
- Provide input at Association meetings regarding proposals.
- Network and communicate with other students regarding advisory committee positions.
- Express student opinions relative to the KSHSAA activities, rules and policies.

The SAT is comprised of two representatives from each of the six KSHSAA classifications. Each school has the opportunity to nominate one male or one female to serve on the SAT.

The administrative staff of the KSHSAA select committee representatives from the applications submitted.

Terms of Membership: Applicants need to be a Junior next year (2018-2019 school year) and will serve a two-year term.

Nominations: Each member school may submit one nomination. Nominations are due by March 2, 2018.

Meetings: The SAT meets twice annually, October and March; specific dates will be determined later.

Efforts are made to minimize overnight travel and loss of classroom time.

Faculty Supervisor: The Athletic/Activities Director or other faculty representative designated by the student representative's school will serve as the student's supervisor at SAT meetings.

Expenses: Consistent with established policy, ex-

penses incurred for the student representative and the Athletic/Activities Director attending SAT meetings will be reimbursed by the KSHSAA unless waived by the member school.

Principals were mailed the application and memo regarding specific openings in January. Please check with your school principal for more information.

Plans for the 2018 KSHSAA Summer Student Council Leadership Workshop are now underway. The theme for this summer's workshop will be





LEADERSHIP LESSONS FROM GLOW—OUR NEXT GENERATION OF LEADERS

Always Be Courageous

The way I initially learned the ABC's was "Always Be Confident," but this past week I decided to change it, as what is more valuable than confidence is courage. When you are a courageous leader there are times when you need to be confident no doubt, but being a great leader goes beyond that. Being a courageous leader's means always being accountable, it means sometimes making tough decisions for the greater good. At times it even means being respected rather than being liked. When you are courageous, you commit to your vision and to your team and do whatever you need to do to keep on track. Leaders that lack courage are the ones that are followers. To be a great leader – Always Be Courageous!

Be Authentic

As leaders we often look to other's who we admire. We examine what their strengths are and then we try to emulate those strengths so that we too can be perceived as great leaders. COUNCIL OF EXCELLENCE AWARDS AVAILABLE FOR MIDDLE & HIGH SCHOOLS

The purpose of the NASC High School Council of Excellence and Middle School Council of Excellence Awards are to provide national recognition for student councils that maintain strong year-round programs. This award provides broader recognition for the most worthy efforts of NASC member schools. All councils meet-

ing the determined criteria in this application will receive the appropriate award.

The complete information describing the governance, activities, and services that a student council may accomplish is located on the NASC Website—www.nasc.us. Because of the variations in school size and council structure,

it is not expected that individual councils will complete the entire list. Different levels of awards will be given, determined by how many listed items the school has checked as submitted and documented. Submissions will be verified by NASC.

To show that a school's student council is strong from year to year, the award documentation dates run from January 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017.

Application postmark deadline will be February 15, 2018.
