2022 GIRLS SOCCER POSTSEASON

- Regional assignments, postseason brackets, state site information, and current “Girls Standings” may all be accessed via links located under “GIRLS STATE” on the right side of the [KSHSAA SOCCER HOMEPAGE](#).
- Higher seeded teams will host throughout regionals and quarterfinals and will wear home team uniforms.
- Squad Lists/Rosters are completed online by each participating school (SC-8 = Regional Contests & SC-9 = Quarterfinal Contests) and shared/emailed to host schools/sites prior to any contest.
- School Administration – Be sure to report game scores immediately to Rod Garman. Also, communicate game info for subsequent rounds including dates, locations, and start times.
- Ticket Prices for Regional Contests: Adults = \$6.00 and Students K-12 = \$5.00
- Ticket Prices for Quarterfinal Contests: Adults = \$7.00 and Students K-12 = \$6.00



POSTSEASON SCHEDULE

- May 16-17 (Monday-Tuesday) – Regional Play-In & First Round
- May 19 (Thursday) – Regional Finals
- May 24 (Tuesday) – Quarterfinals
- May 27 (Friday) – Semifinals (5:00 and 7:00)
- May 28 (Saturday) – Finals (12:00 = Consolation & 2:00 = Championship)

SUSPENSION OF POSTSEASON TOURNAMENT GAMES – NFHS RULE 7-1-3

In the event a game must be suspended because of conditions which make it impossible to continue play, the head referee shall declare it an official game if one complete half or more of the game has been played. If less than one-half of the game has been played (according to KSHSAA adoption), the game will be restarted from the point of suspension when conditions allow. A winner must be determined in postseason competition, so all efforts to complete a game will be conducted. Full, complete games are desired in postseason competition.

The KSHSAA does have a **goal differential policy** whereby at the end of the first half, if one team has gained a **10-goal difference** or if it achieves such a differential during the second half, the game shall be terminated.

Prioritize sportsmanship and respect. Consequences remain the same during postseason competition as during the regular season for Red Cards issued to players and coaches. A player or coach red carded in the final game of the season shall serve the one-game suspension in the first game of the next season. See pages 10-11 of the 2021-22 KSHSAA Soccer Manual for further clarification.

OVERTIME PROCEDURE FOR POSTSEASON TOURNAMENT CONTESTS

All postseason tournament games that end in a tie will continue to play until a winner is determined using the following format: When the score is tied at the end of regulation time, the referee will instruct both teams to return to their respective team boxes. There will be five minutes during which both teams may confer with their coaches, and the head referee will instruct both teams as to proper procedure.

1. There shall be two 10-minute sudden victory overtime periods with a two-minute interval between periods.

a. A coin toss shall be held as in Rule 5-2-2(d)(3).

b. At the end of the first 10-minute sudden victory overtime period, teams shall change ends.

2. If a tie still exists, there shall be two five-minute sudden victory overtime periods.

a. A coin toss shall be held as in Rule 5-2-2(d)(3).

b. At end of the first sudden victory period, teams shall change ends.

3. If the score still remains tied, all coaches, officials and team captains shall assemble at the halfway line to review the procedure as outlined below:

a. The head referee shall choose the goal at which all the penalty kicks shall be taken.

b. Each coach will select any five players, including the goalkeeper, on or off the field (except those who may have been disqualified) to take the penalty kicks.

c. A coin toss shall be held. The team winning the toss shall have choice of kicking first or second.

d. Teams will alternate kickers. There is no follow-up on the kick.

e. Following five kicks for each team, the team scoring the greatest number of kicks shall be declared winner.

f. Add one goal to the winning team score and credit the team with a victory. An asterisk (*) may be placed by the team advancing to indicate the advancement was the result of a tiebreaker system.

4. If the score remains tied after each team has had five penalty kicks:

a. Each coach will select five different players than the first five who already have kicked to take the penalty kicks in a sudden victory situation, wherein if one team scores and the other team does not score, the game is ended without more kicks being taken.

b. If the score remains tied, continue the sudden victory penalty kicks with the coach selecting any five players to take the next set of alternating penalty kicks. If a tie still remains, repeat 4-a.

SUMMER MORATORIUM = JULY 4-10, 2022

There shall be NO school related athletic activities. During this time coaches (licensed teacher coaches and coach aides employed by member schools) shall be prohibited from engaging in any type of activity involving student athletes whether it be practice, training, weightlifting, conditioning, competition or travel. All member school athletic facilities will be closed during this period to school personnel and students grades 7-12. If member school athletic facilities also serve as non-school community recreation facilities, these facilities may remain open during the moratorium so long as no school teams are playing, and no school coaches are coaching the teams/individuals. During this one-week dead period, students may attend camps or competitions but may not do so with their school coaches. Click [HERE](#) for more information and interpretations.
